- II. Topics of Discussion 4:45-5:45pm
 - A. Cultivando Cambio: Latine Community Advocacy Internship
 - a. Empower youth to reduce alcohol consumption in the community
 - b. Strengthening civil engagement
 - c. Interns learned how to recognize media bias
 - d. Social Determinants of Health (Housing, Employment, Education, Healthcare, Income, Social Context)
 - i. Alcohol as a coping mechanism for teens (specifically, Latino youth)
 - e. San Rafael has a high density of liquor stores
 - i. Alcohol density in these neighborhoods
 - f. Campaign - (Culturally Responsive Education, Youth Engagement and Leadership, Family-Centered Interventions, Policy and Environmental Change)

- g. Community Impacts of Alcohol Consumption
 - i. Health risks, Academic and Career Setbacks, Family and Cultural Disconnect, and Community Safety
 - ii. 53% of 11th graders in Marin reported drinking alcohol
- h. Youth Call to Action
 - i. More resources, prevention, school presentations to inform youth, and community policies to prevent youth alcohol consumption
 - ii. Youth feel more confident talking about this with friends and family after learning during the internship
- B. Youth Housed in County Jails (SYTFs)
 - a. Background
 - i. CA counties needed to find housing for juvenile offenders
 - ii. Detaining youths for restoration purposes, not punitive
 - iii. SYTF youth 14 or older who have committed serious or violent felonies
 - iv. 2 counties where youth housed in SYTF locations have been moved to the county jail
 - 1. Incidents that happened with youth at these county jails have led to worse prison sentences
 - a. No longer receiving rehabilitative services in these jails that they had access to at SYTF facilities
 - v. An adult convicted of a crime they committed as a juvenile can petition to be put in a juvenile facility
 - vi. Not a lot of youth with 707b going to Marin County jail
 - vii. Try to go with the least restrictive sentence first when dealing with juveniles
 - viii. Juveniles have to be 16 or older to be convicted of a 707b offense
 - 1. The judge decides if they go to adult court or juvenile court
 - ix. One youth in the SYTF location (not sure if it's a 707b offense)
- C. Strip Searches in Juvenile Detentions
 - a. JJDPC went into the Alameda County facility and found that staff had done a strip search of an entire hall and violated some of the policies
 - i. The Office of Youth Restoration also found this to be true
 - ii. Body scanners are now used instead
 - b. There is a tracking mechanism for strip searches and approval of them
 - c. Judge determines weekend commitments.
 - d. There has been a push away from weekend commitments because of contraband being brought in.
 - i. This, paired with a push away from strip searches
